As a student at Burwood Girls High School you are expected to:

- Attend every school day; be in class on time and be prepared to learn to the best of your ability.
- Maintain a neat appearance, including adhering to the requirements of the school's uniform policy.
- Behave safely, considerately and responsibly, including when travelling to and from school.
- Show respect at all times for yourself, your peers, your teaches and other school staff, including
 following class rules, cooperating with instructions and learning activities and resolving problems
 peacefully and fairly.
- Treat one another with dignity and respect and display good citizenship at school and in the community.
- Take pride in your achievements and your school and care for the school environment and property belonging to you, the school and others.

Behaviour that infringes on the safety of others, such as harassment, bullying, cyberbullying and illegal or antisocial behaviour of any kind, will not be tolerated.

Attendance

Satisfactory attendance is a requirement for meeting syllabus outcomes and the award of the RoSA or the Higher School Certificate. Burwood Girls High School expects students to attend school regularly and punctually.

Absence and lateness

In the case of **absence**, parents/carers should notify the school **by 9am** by phone or email. Phone calls must be confirmed by an email or letter signed by the parent/carer, to be handed to the roll call teacher. Please include the student's full name and year and provide any supporting documents, such as a medical certificate.

In the case of **lateness**, parents should notify the school by phone or email. Phone calls must be confirmed by an email, letter or 'swipe machine' note signed by the parent/carer, to be handed to the roll call teacher. Please

include the student's full name and year and provide any supporting documents. If the student arrives late due to a know reason (e.g. medical appointment), the student must bring a signed note from home (or the medical/health provider) to hand to the office when they swipe in.

It is preferred that all appointments be made outside school hours so that your child's learning is not disrupted. However, we do understand that this cannot always occur.

Unexplained lateness or absence results in an SMS message being sent to parent/s mobile phone on the day. Parents may reply to the SMS, stating a **valid reason** for the absence. Timely notification from parents prevents unnecessary texts, calls and investigations by the school.

Punctuality in the mornings is important. Students who arrive late must report to the front office and swipe in for an authority to enter class. All students **must** bring their ID card to school **every day**. (This will be issued after photo day early in the year)

Early leave

If you know in advance that you have to leave the school during school hours, you must bring a signed permission note from a parent/carer and hand it to the roll call teacher (or the front office if you arrive after roll call). If the Deputy Principal approves your request, you must collect your early leave pass from the front office at the time you need to leave the school.

Extended leave

In an extended period of leave (5 school days or more) is necessary, parents must request leave from the principal, in writing, at least one week prior to the leave, by completing the DoE form available from the front office or website. Supporting documentation is to be included, indicating departure and return dates (i.e. copy of itinerary for domestic travel or plane tickets for overseas travel).

Swipe card instructions, Years 7-10

SCHOOL COMMENCES AT 8:45AM. A reminder bell will be rung at 8:40am to alert students to go directly to their Roll Call classroom. Rolls are marked promptly and returned to the office. If you arrive after 8:45am you must get a late note from the front office, otherwise you are marked absent for the whole day and an SMS will go out to your parents.

YOU MUST HAVE YOUR ID CARD WITH YOU EVERY DAY

- 1. Swipe your ID card through the reader (barcode at the bottom and photo facing away from you so you can see the magnetic strip). The reader will beep once if it has read your card and your details will appear on the screen.
- 2. If you are **late without a note** carefully **press 1 & 2** on the number pad. A receipt will be printed. The top one goes to your class teacher and the bottom one goes to be signed by your parent/carer. **You must return this signed slip to your roll call teacher.**
- 3. If you are **late with a note** carefully **press 1 & 1 again. WAIT** for authorisation by someone in the office. A receipt will be printed and you take this to your class teacher.

Sick bay / first aid

The sick bay is located near the front office and is available for emergency illness and accidents only. Do not come to school if you are sick. If you are too ill to return to class after visiting the sick bay, your parents will be contacted to collect you. Students are NOT to use mobile phones to call parents. If you are ill or injured during class, recess or lunch, you should report immediately to a teacher to obtain a note to go to the sick bay. Please make sure we have current contact details for parents and emergency contact people.

In Year 7 students are eligible to join large ensembles. Small ensembles are tailored to more advanced playing, and open to membership by audition or invitation. Students who wish to start to learn or pick up a new instrument as a beginner are well catered for with accelerated training groups that operate in terms 1-3: Junior Band and Binyang Strings. Rehearsals for all ensembles are held before/after school or at lunch.

Private Instrumental Lessons: We have a team of highly experienced teachers for all woodwind, brass, string, percussion instruments, plus piano, voice, musicianship and composition. Lessons are conducted at school during school time on a rotating basis. <u>All BEP participants must have private lessons as a condition of membership</u>. This can be with an existing tutor, or one of the tutors who teach at school. We do encourage students to have lessons with our tutors, as this will enhance their experience and allow their lessons to better meet their needs.

Fees: There are 3 separate fees:

- Program membership. (necessary to cover the cost of conductors, music, equipment, maintenance and administrative personnel).
- Instrument Hire, if required. (some 'rare' instruments needed in an ensemble may be offered a
 discounted rate)
- Instrumental Lessons. (these charges are based on the rates recommended each year by the NSW Music Teachers' Association and are billed by and payable directly to the individual teacher.)

Bring Your Own Device (BYOD)

at Burwood Girls High School in 2024

What is BYOD?

Bring Your Own Device or BYOD is a strategy which allows students to use their own personal digital devices within the school and class environments for learning. One of the main features of this program is free access to the Department of Education and Communities' filtered internet service through the school's Wi-Fi network.

Why use BYOD?

Research indicates the potential for students to use connected digital devices to deepen learning, make learning more personalised and student-centred and to enhance development of 21st century learning skills. https://bit.ly/3R1fVw7

BYOD in Year 7 2024

Year 7 are asked to bring their own computing device to school every day. The device will be solely for the student's use during the day.

Prior to bringing a personal device for the first time, students and their parents will need to read and sign a **BYOD Student User Agreement** which will set out the responsibilities and expectations for use of the personal device at Burwood Girls High School.

What type of device can we bring?

BYOD is designed to give students and family's freedom to make technology choices that suit them and their circumstances.

The device must meet the **minimum device requirements** for both connection to the school Wi-Fi network, and for the device to be functional as an aid to learning. The **minimum device requirements** are outlined separately, over the page.

Many students have already indicated that they have a suitable device. Parents and students considering the purchase of a computing device should ensure that it meets the **minimum device requirements**.

What about the cost of a laptop?

The purchase of a device can be a significant expense but when the cost of a quality device is viewed over three to four years, the expense is considerably less. Many teachers feel that a laptop device with a **keyboard** is the most appropriate for use in the high school context. Tablets do not have the necessary processing power to run the necessary programs.

Burwood Girls High School places significant emphasis on the integration of technology into many aspects of teaching and learning. The school is committed to its obligation as a public education institution to deliver the same learning outcomes for all our students no matter their families' financial means. The school has developed several strategies which will ensure access to information and communication technologies for all students.

Minimum Requirements for BYOD devices

Wireless Connection

Tablets or laptops must have this minimum wireless capability: The DoE wireless network installed in high schools only operates on the **802.11n 5GHz** standard. Devices with 802.11a/b/g or 802.11n 2.4GHz only will not be able to connect.

Software

Other than operating system, no other software is required.

Note: Microsoft Office and Adobe Creative Suite is available for DoE students to download at no cost.

BYOD Checklist



Wireless Connectivity

Wireless connectivity is key to BYOD devices in schools!

Devices must support **5GHz** dual band wireless or 802.11 a/b/g/n. (Make sure it supports both **'a' and 'n'**.)

This is the most important feature for connection to the DoE network; otherwise, you will need to buy a Wi-Fi adapter.



Battery Life Minimum 5hrs

Devices need to last the school day. We recommend a minimum of 5hrs battery life.



Memory and RAM 32GB Memory 8GB RAM

To be able to store and process data effectively these minimum specifications are essential.



Hardware Features Camera & microphone

These are necessary to ensure students can participate in 21 century learning activities, a stylus may be useful, and a keyboard is needed.



Screen Size 14 inch screen

Whilst all laptops should be compatible, screens need a minimum 14 inch to ensure ease of use throughout an entire school day.

Other Essential Considerations

Casing: Needs to be tough and sturdy. Can it be dropped

without breaking?

Weight: Is the laptop light enough for student to carry each day?

Durability: Consider the overall durability of the device. Are the

keys and inputs sturdy?



Accessories

Carry Case: A carry case or skin is essential in protecting your device and can

provide ergonomic advantages.

Insurance: Devices can become lost or be broken easily at school. Make sure

your policy covers these eventualities.

Warranty: Make sure you consider purchasing extra warranty to reduce future

repair costs as these devices will be used extensively.

BURWOOD STUDENTS HIGH SCHOOL HOMEWORK POLICY

The main purpose of homework is to support learning. Research indicates that homework will only achieve this purpose if it is well planned and meaningful. At Burwood Students High School, we believe strongly that it is important for all students to have homework designed to meet specific learning goals. Research indicates that student learning may be enhanced if homework is assigned by teachers with a specific, explicit learning purpose. On completion, teachers should acknowledge student effort and provide feedback related to student learning.

However, we also recognise research findings which show that:

- Homework that is too lengthy or too demanding can be counterproductive and reduce the motivation of students to engage in learning.
- The quality of the homework assigned is likely to be more important than the quantity.
- Homework must be purposeful and relevant to student needs and should not jeopardise the right of children to enjoy a balanced lifestyle.
- The amount of homework and time spent on it should accord with the student's age and developmental level.
- Effort spent on homework is a stronger correlation of academic achievement than time spent on homework.
- Year level appears to be a determinant of homework's academic effectiveness.

Time expectations for homework

When homework is given, the teacher will indicate the time that most students should require for the completion of the task which is assigned.

The following are our recommended guidelines. They aim to ensure that neither too much nor too little homework is given on most nights.

Students who are absent from class or do not complete classwork in a timely manner will be responsible for "catching-up" missed work in their own time.

Middle School

The BGHS School Plan targets quality assessment practices in the middle school.

Students will be given a range of assignments or assessment tasks that they will be required to research and complete in their own time to demonstrate achievement of outcomes in each of their subjects.

Assessment tasks encourage students to pursue knowledge accurately and innovatively, including:

- creating or designing something
- investigating
- researching
- writing

Whenever possible, homework should recognise the place of <u>technology</u> and its benefits, such as the internet, for organising and accessing information.

<u>Mathematics</u> As a general rule of thumb, we would expect students in the junior school to complete about two hours of mathematics homework each week. This works out at less than twenty minutes

each night. As students move into the senior school, they should expect to complete up to three hours of homework a week.

Mathematics students will typically be required to complete activities commenced in class at home. This allows students to practise their skills and to consolidate their understanding of the work. It should also help develop confidence with their learning. In addition, students can spend time reviewing past lessons and other resources.

Parents are asked to encourage their children to complete their homework. If your child is having difficulty with a particular task, please encourage them to seek assistance from their teacher. Please feel free to contact the Mathematics Faculty if you have any concerns.

Year 7 – Students in Year 7 are to complete homework in Maths, reading and Education Perfect program in English and vocabulary in Languages. Whilst there will not be homework in other subjects, students will be given assessment tasks to complete at home (including study and revision for a class test).

There should be NO holiday assessment tasks assigned. This includes work due in the first week of a term.

We would expect students in Year 7 to complete about two hours of mathematics homework each week.

Year 8 – Homework requirements in Year 8 will be expected to include Maths, English, Science and vocabulary in Languages. As in Year 7, students will receive assessment tasks from other subjects to demonstrate their achievement of learning outcomes.

There should be NO holiday assessment tasks assigned. This includes work due in the first week of a term.

We would expect students in Year 8 to complete about two hours of mathematics homework each week

Year 9 – Year 9 students will be required to complete homework, as directed by their teachers, in all relevant subjects. 1-2 hours per night (Mon–Fri). A maximum of 30 minutes homework per night for a subject. An average maximum of 90 minutes homework per week for a subject i.e. 2 - 3 times per week. Assessment tasks are a major component of a teacher's formal assessment strategies. There should be NO holiday homework tasks assigned, for example work due in the first week of a term.

We would expect students in Year 9 to complete about two hours of mathematics homework each week.

Senior School

Year 10

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ –2 hours per night (Mon–Fri). Weekend homework may be required at times. A maximum of 30 minutes homework per night per subject. An average maximum of 90 minutes homework per week for a subject i.e. 2 - 4 times per week.

We would expect students in Year 10 to complete about two hours of mathematics homework each week. 5.3 or accelerated students may require longer periods of homework and study.

Years 11-12

2–3 hours per night. Weekend work will be required regularly to keep on top of HSC course demands and assessments. Holiday revision is normal for most students and many choose to use some vacation time on long-term assessment tasks.

Guidelines for Students

- Homework is an important part of your learning and you should make it a priority to complete all homework as well as you can.
- Get organised by using your Student Diary to record all the work you are given. This will help you to plan the books you need to take home and the time you will need to do the work each night.
- If you have a problem with getting your work done, bring a note from your parents or discuss it with your teacher at the start of the lesson, e.g. family commitments, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, feeling unwell, too much work, work is too difficult and you need help etc. Your teacher will be as understanding as possible.
- Ask your teacher, preferably in advance, for an extension of time if you are particularly busy. Discuss problems with your teacher, who will be pleased to see that you are interested in doing as well as you can.

The Homework Centre

The Homework Centre runs every Wednesday and Thursday afternoon in the school library from 3:30-5:30pm. The Homework Centre is free and the school hires former students to assist those who need help with their homework or study. There is a strong focus on support in Maths and Science, but help with other subjects is available (there is always a teacher present). Two of the tutors speak Mandarin.

Students don't have to use the tutors. Students may come and do their own study or homework. The Homework Centre is combined with the ESL Help Centre to allow ESL students to get further support with their work.

Students can use the Centre whenever they like – it is not a permanent commitment and students are not required to stay the full 2 hours.



FOOTWEAR FOR BURWOOD GHS

ALL students must wear the CORRECT FOOTWEAR. This is essential for lessons in any of the TAS, CAPA and Science specialist rooms.

The Department of Education's Work Health Safety requirements state 'it is mandatory that students carrying out practical activities using chemicals or equipment wear enclosed leather shoes'.

Footwear such as thongs, open weave type shoes or shoes with openings at toes or heels, platform or high heel shoes, should not be worn to school. Soft leather shoes such as suede, canvas, vinyl or nylon-covered shoes are **not suitable**.

The diagram below illustrates examples of acceptable and unacceptable footwear at school.



Enclosed black leather shoes are part of the uniform at Burwood Girls High School. Shoes that are fully enclosed and have firm leather uppers are suitable. These shoes ensure that students are protected from sharp objects such as knives, scissors and chisels, hot liquids such as boiling water, or falling timber and any chemicals.

A student wearing incorrect footwear will have to be excluded from taking part in the practical aspect of their work. They will, however, be set work which will not exclude them from a particular class session.

The School Opal card

The School Opal card gives eligible students free or discounted travel between home and school using metro, train, bus, ferry and light rail services you nominate in your application.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for a School Opal card, students may need to live a minimum distance from their school:

Years K-2 (Infants)

There is no minimum distance.

Years 3-6 (Primary)

More than 1.6km straight line distance or at least 2.3km walking.

Years 7-12 (Secondary)

More than 2.0km straight line distance or at least 2.9km walking.



If you live too close to be eligible for free travel, you may still qualify for a School Term Bus Pass, which offers travel on buses between home and school at a discounted rate for the whole school term.

Who needs to apply

A new application is only required if the student has not had a School Opal card before.

If the student already has a School Opal card and is changing schools, campuses or home address, you will need to update their Opal card for the new school year before mid-December at apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts

How to apply

Applications for next year open at the start of Term 4 this year.

Step 1

Once the new school has confirmed your child's enrolment, complete the application at apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts

Step 2

The school endorses your application.

Step 3

Once Transport for NSW has approved the application, a School Opal card will be sent to the address provided on the application.



Better together

The School Opal card is only for travel to and from school. So it's a good idea to get a Child/Youth Opal card for travel after hours, on weekends or during school holidays.

Child/Youth Opal card benefits

- Concession fares across the Opal network
- Half-price travel after eight paid journeys each week*

School Student Travel

Term 4 2023

2024 school travel applications are now open

Students who need a new or replacement School Opal card or travel pass for 2024 can <u>apply</u> now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement because of a new shared parental arrangement (e.g. joint custody).

Students who change address, school, campus location, have repeated a year or received an expiry notification for their school travel entitlement should <u>renew or update</u> their details <u>before</u> the end of term 4. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications, and travel passes remain valid for the start of the 2024 school year. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade (i.e. grade two to grade three), the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new eligibility criteria, we will send an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2024.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note**: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

Changes to your bus service provider

Within Greater Sydney, a number of bus service providers have changed their names.

Parents intending to lodge an application for a School Opal card will need to visit <u>transportnsw.info</u> <u>trip planner</u> to obtain the correct bus operator name servicing your area prior to lodging an application.

Travel from Term 12024

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

Applications for 2024 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel open at the start of Term 4 2023, so parents/students can <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a busy period for local transport operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations difficult.

We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local</u> bus operator to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

Students using School Opal cards are also reminded that they must tap on and tap off in line with the Student code of conduct and Opal terms of use.





Be SAFE

- Never hack, disable, or bypass any hardware or software security, including any virus protection, spam and filter settings. This includes the use of a VPN

Be RESPONSIBLE

- Follow all school rules and instructions from school staff, including when using digital devices and online services.
- Students will not use their own device to knowingly search for, link to, access or send anything that is:
 - √ offensive
 - ✓ pornographic
 - √ threatening
 - √ abusive or defamatory
 - ✓ considered to be bullying.
- Take care with the digital devices you use: make sure the devices you bring to school are fully charged each day and are stored appropriately when not in use;
- Understand that you and your parents/carers are responsible for any repairs or IT support your personal devices might need.
